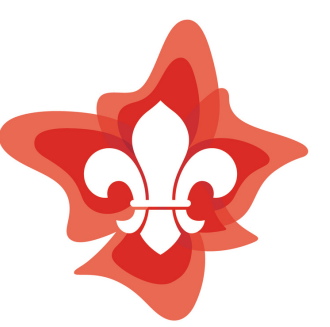


WELCOME TO ROVERS



5 Steps to Become a Rover

Becoming a Rover is an exciting step in your Scouting journey! Here's how to get started:

1. Visit Rover Units
 - Before you turn 18, you're welcome to visit different Rover Units to find one that suits you. This starts your linking process.
2. Apply for a Working with Children Check (WWCC)
 - You can apply for your WWCC before your 18th birthday.
 - Once you receive it email a copy to membership@scoutswa.com.au
3. Complete an A1 Form
 - After turning 18, fill out an A1 form.
 - Have it signed by your Unit Leader or Group Leader, then send it to Membership.
4. Complete a National Police Check
 - Once your A1 is processed, you'll receive a link from Veritas for a national police check.
 - Follow the link and provide the required ID.
5. Complete Mandatory Training
 - Log in to training.scouts.com.au and complete the following modules:
 - Code of Conduct
 - Child Safe Scouting
 - WHS for Scouting
6. ScoutMap Account
 - As an adult member you will receive your own ScoutMap account and Login, you will use this account to register for events and update your Medical and Dietary information.
 - Make sure you log in and update your contact information.



Western Australian Rover Council (WARC)

What is WARC?

The Western Australian Rover Council (WARC) is the governing body for Rovers in WA. It supports the growth and development of Rover Scouts, both within Scouting and the wider community. Rovers are the only self-managed youth section in Scouts Australia. WARC works alongside the National Rover Council (NRC) and Branch Youth Councils (BYCs) in each state.

Who Can Attend?

All registered Rovers in Australia are welcome to attend WARC meetings. Each WA Unit sends at least two delegates, and meetings are run by the WARC Executive team.

Why Attend?

WARC is a great way to meet Rovers from other Units, stay informed about events, and have a say in shaping Rovers in WA.

When & Where?

Meetings are held at 7pm on the first Sunday of each month (unless it's a long weekend) at Scouts WA HQ – 133 Scarborough Beach Rd, Mt Hawthorn.

About Rover Scouts

Rover Scouts is for young adults aged 18–25 who are looking for adventure, fun, and personal growth. You don't need any previous Scouting experience — just a willingness to get involved, try new things, and be part of a team.

Rover Units are run by the Rovers themselves, giving you the chance to lead and plan activities, and shape your experience. Whether it's camping, hiking, social events, community service, or large-scale events, there's something for everyone.

Social activities are a big part of the Rover experience — think balls, bush dances, car rallies, and "Moots" (gatherings of Rovers at local, national, or international levels). It's a great way to meet new people, make lasting friendships, and be part of a vibrant community.

Rovers is about meeting great people, developing leadership and life skills, and challenging yourself in new ways. You might help organise a simple weekend away or contribute to a major event with thousands of participants.

With thousands of Rovers across Australia — and connections worldwide — the opportunities are endless.

Child Safe Scouting – What Rovers Need to Know

The transition from Venturers to Rovers can be a big shift — you are now an adult member, and while it's great to stay in touch with Venturer friends, it's important to always follow child-safe practices.

Keeping young people safe is Scouts Australia's top priority — and it's something all Rover Scouts should understand as newly adult members of the movement.

All adults in Scouting must:

- Complete thorough screening and hold a valid Working with Children Check.
- Undertake training in child safety, leadership, and WHS.
- Follow the "two-adult leadership" rule — at least two adults are present at all Scouting activities.

Every State Branch has a dedicated team to handle child safety concerns. If you see or hear something that doesn't feel right — speak up. Everyone plays a part in making Scouting safe and respectful for all.
